# REPORT ON 2020 MARCH IN THE PARK

Sue Lawson and Mona Hawes, Joint Chairs of this event have provided the following update on March in the Park:

Saturday, March 14 was a beautiful, sunny day at Rotary Park, and thanks to our many hardworking, dedicated club members, the Garden Club of Cape Coral held another successful March in the Park.

Although we only clocked 729 attendees, much fewer than last year due to the Covid-19 virus concerns, our club brought in nearly \$10,000 - as much money as last year! After expenses, we'll net about \$7,500, so we'll be able to continue funding our scholarships and monetary gifts to schools.

We ended up with 38 vendors after a few cancellations and last-minute additions. Some were disappointed in their sales but understood why based on the circumstances. Good news is we already have six applications – two paid - for next year.

We overheard many people say: "I enjoy coming every year," and they were happy to think about spring growing and enjoying their gardens.

We'd like to thank all the club members for their efforts and welcome any suggestions you may have to make our event even better in the future.

# Our Biennial Flower Show – The Golden Years of Cape Coral

Our flower show celebrating Cape Coral's golden anniversary of incorporation has been postponed until the Autumn. The tentative dates are Oct. 21-24, with entries being received on Oct. 22 and 23, judging on the 23<sup>rd</sup>, and open to the public after judging on the 23<sup>rd</sup> and on Saturday, Oct. 24. Once we have been able to reserve the room at the Library (no bookings are being allowed at this time), the schedule will be updated with the new details and circulated to you all.

In the meantime, this time lapse gives you all a great opportunity to look at the classes (which will remain unchanged) and select those that appeal to you, particularly in the design area. If you're a novice designer, perhaps you can use some of the spare time that we all have now to research floral design online and learn from the expertise of others.

We (the Flower Show Committee: Kathy Woodlock, Sylvia Swartz, Sue Lawson, Nancy Colgan and Fran McIntyre) are thinking of this postponement in a positive sense since it will be the first time that we will be able to showcase Florida's fall flora. Previously all our shows have taken place in the spring so this will be something really different for us. So, get those thinking caps on, take time to tour your yard and think about what will be available to you in October. Nurture it so that it will be at its best when you want to snip and cut those specimens.

Here's a reminder of what's included in the schedule:

The show has four sections: Horticulture, Design, Botanical Arts and a Special Exhibits educational section.

### Horticulture



Horticulture is so easy to enter – just snip anything from your yard that matches any of the categories shown in the schedule and bring it to the SW Cape Library on entry days. You just need to know the item's botanical name, or someone will help you look it up at the show. Use the time that we now have to research your plants on the web – it's so easy to identify them by comparing photos on the web to the plants in your yard.



#### Design

Design takes a little more effort than Horticulture. Below you will see an extract from our schedule with examples of designs that match our classes. Remember that the theme of the show celebrates *The Golden Years of Cape Coral* so all the classes reflect that title, and it follows that your designs should try to reflect/interpret the title of the particular class you are entering.

Key things to remember: NO ARTIFICIAL MATERIAL IN THE DESIGN AND NO DYED PLANT MATERIAL

SECTION A. Golden Nuggets
Class 1: Golden Sunset in Cape Coral –
12" Petite Design

Entries Consultant: Julia Palmer

A petite design no larger than 12" x 12" including container, staged on 18" of a black painted surface 42" high provided by Committee. Underlay to be provided by designer (counts toward overall size).

# Class 2: Diving for Gold in Cape Coral – 8" Petite underwater Design -

Entries/Consultant: Julia Palmer

Example of petite underwater design



A creative design staged on 18" of a black painted surface 42" high provided by Committee, having some or all plant material and other optional component(s) submerged in water. Plant material and other components under water must contribute to the overall design and are selected for their lasting quality.

# Class 3: A Salute to Cape Coral - 5" Petite Creative Mass design -

Entries/Consultant: Julia Palmer



Petite creative mass design example

A creative design staged on 18" of a black painted surface 42" high provided by the Committee, emphasizing a greater proportion of plant material and components other than space. The silhouette of the design is visually closed, and rhythm contained within. Open spaces may be incorporated within the closed silhouette. Designer underlay optional.

SECTION B. Eating Out in the Cape
Class 4: Picnicking on Cape Coral Beach A Functional Table for Alfresco dining

Entries/Consultant: Susan Lawson

A functional table set for service of 2 people with a decorative unit (a completed floral design using plant material and other accessories) included. A containergrown plant alone is not a design. Staged on a 30"

square card table supplied by the committee. Exhibitor should supply a suitable table covering.

# Class 5: Caloosahatchee Reflections - An Exhibition Table

Entries/Consultant: Susan Lawson



Designer's choice of materials staged on half of a 6' table (36" W) x 30" D, x 29" high, covered with a beige cloth supplied by Committee, incorporating a 48" high by 32" wide staging panel

backboard provided by the exhibitor. (Backboards available on loan from Committee). Underlay optional. Created artistically to suggest the service of food with no requirements as to the type or number of table appointments. Plant material must be used as needed for the overall design.

## Class 6: Brunch on the Boat - A Tray design -

A tray (supplied by exhibitor) for one, with a Decorative Unit in proportion to the one place setting. Will be staged on 1/4 of a 6' table covered with a being cloth provided

with a beige cloth provided by the Committee. Space

allotted measures 36" W x 15" D x 29" high, freestanding. The tray requires an appropriate-sized Decorative Unit with the stability of the Decorative Unit given importance.

SECTION C. Tripling the Gold
Class 7: Sunrise over the Beach –

**Creative Line Design** 

Entries/Consultant: Fran McIntyre *Example of a creative line design:* 



A creative design where line is dominant with a minimum of plant material and other optional components. The line may be straight, curved or a combination. There may be one or more points of emergence and focal areas. Use of a two-dimensional 48" x 32" wide

staging panel is suggested. Underlays supplied by exhibitor are permitted.

Class 8: Golden Days in Cape Coral - Duo Design Entries/Consultant: Fran McIntyre Example of a duo design

A creative design staged on half of a 6' x 30' x 29" high table covered with a beige cloth supplied by Committee. Design is organized in one container or containers joined to appear as one. Organized as two designs back to back and entered in two separate design classes with the schedule specifying both titles. Each side appears as a distinctly different design. Staging must allow for easy viewing on both sides of the design.

# Class 9: Golden Nights in Cape Coral – Duo Design

Entries/Consultant: Fran McIntyre Example of a duo design (back)



A creative design staged on half of a 6' x 30' x 29" high table covered with a beige cloth supplied by Committee. Design is organized in one container or

containers joined to appear as one. Organized as two designs back to back and entered in two separate design classes with the schedule specifying both titles. Each side appears as a distinctly different design. Staging must allow for easy viewing on both sides of the design.

# Class 1 *Rewarding 50 years*A Golden Anniversary Giftbox

A decorative Golden Anniversary gift package (shoebox supplied by the Committee) decorated using fresh and/or dried plant material, displayed on a 15" x 15" space supplied by committee with appropriate underlay provided by the exhibitor.

# Class 2. **Celebrating 50 years**An Invitation to a Golden Anniversary Tea

Create a 4"x 6"paper invitation (blank card supplied by Committee) for a golden anniversary

tea using dried or fresh flowers. Invitation must be able to be slipped in an envelope - not highrelief. Staged on part of a single staging panel provided by the Committee.

# Class 3. **Topping out the Golden Anniversary Celebration**

A wearable Fascinator suitable for a Golden Anniversary Formal Event

A decorated Fascinator (supplied by Committee). Exhibit must include some fresh and/or dried material. Only dried material may be treated. Staged on a mannequin head (supplied by the Committee) on quarter of a 34" square card table supplied by committee.

### How to enter:

On the scheduled date in October bring your horticulture entries to the back, side door of the Library during the designated times that you will find in the updated schedule. You will receive it as soon as the date has been finalized. Only the dates will have changed – everything else will be the same.

We hope to run a design workshop and more information will be available on that when it is safe for us to gather together again.

# Club Directory Photography Competition – continues!

Keep those entries coming! Go ahead, showcase your gardens and plants that you're proud of. **Bulbs**: Cannas thrive in the heat of summer. New varieties have colorful leaves as well as flowers. **See** *Bulbs* for

Herbs: Some to start now include basil, coriander,

cumin, and mint.

**Vegetables**: Beans, Chinese cabbage, Southern peas, and sweet potatoes can still be planted.
