The Ground Diaries – New Addition to the Newsletter

The Garden Club will now have a new question and answer section in the newsletter – *The Ground Diaries*. Each month we will have a question that has been submitted by one of the members of the club. As we know gardening in southwest Florida can be very challenging. Many of our members are very knowledgeable about gardening in Cape Coral. Some of our members, who are also Master Gardeners, have been trained to research questions on the UF/IFAS website. While this is researched information, sometimes the common knowledge our members have can be just as helpful. Below is the first question submitted by Bonnie Klockner. Dale Manuel, one of the club's Master Gardeners, has provided the answer to the question. If you have any questions or would like to be on the panel to answer questions, please contact Donna Schmidt.

Question: How much amending of the Cape Coral soil do you need to do before planting a flowering plant and what is best to use?

Answer: Soil remediation for Cape Coral - Most of Cape Coral was developed from canal dredging or hauled in sand. This is most noticeable when viewing new construction sites. Also adding to the soil composition are construction materials, foundation cement and block, increase soil PH. This results in higher PH soils, above 7 which is neutral. Generally plants prefer a PH of 7 or lower, with some plants, such as Gardenias or Azaleas which prefer a PH of 5.5 to 6.5.

When considering remediation of soil in Cape Coral, chemical treatments with sulfur-based products will not offer a long-term solution since soil PH will wash out. Alternatives are viable.

First choose plants which tolerate higher levels of PH. This guide is very valuable: Plant Guide - Florida-Friendly Landscaping™ Program - University of Florida, Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences - UF/IFAS (ufl.edu).

Secondly, mixing peat, plant compost or animal manure soils with higher PH ones is very beneficial. These are available at big box or landscape stores. Recommended rate is at equal parts.

Third, completely removing the soil for the plant or garden bed at least 12" deep and 12" wider than the planted root ball and replacing with a topsoil which is neutral in PH.

Footnote: Do not plant closer than 3' to the house foundation for two reasons: First, the soil PH will be at its highest level and secondly natural plant DNA thrives in a 360 degree direction.
