#### FROGS IN THE GARDEN

Creating a frog habitat with native plants and a water source in your garden is a rewarding way to support local wildlife and enhance your natural space. Native frogs play a crucial role in maintaining biodiversity by controlling insect populations and serving as a vital food source for other animals. Unfortunately, frogs are rapidly disappearing all around the globe due to human activity. Because frogs are very susceptible to pollution and habitat loss, they are considered an indicator species. By supporting frogs in your garden with native plants, you contribute to restoring a healthy local ecosystem. A healthy frog population suggests a balanced environment, while a decline can indicate ecological disturbances. This makes them essential for monitoring garden health. Moreover, frogs are part of the garden food chain, serving as prey for birds and other wildlife, thereby maintaining ecological balance.

Below is a list of some of the native plants that will attract frogs to your garden.

- **Frogfruit** (*Phyla nodiflora*): This low-growing ground cover provides shelter for small frogs and attracts insects, which are a vital food source for many frog species.
- **Pickerelweed** (*Pontederia cordata*): Pickerelweed is a native aquatic plant that grows near the water's edge. It offers cover and shade for frogs and provides habitat for insects and other aquatic creatures.
- **Cardinal Flower** (*Lobelia cardinalis*): The vibrant red flowers of cardinal flower that naturally grows in wet soil and attract insects as a food source and cover from predators. (Hummingbirds love it too).
- **Milkweed (***Asclepias spp.***)**: Milkweed is a host plant for monarch butterflies, but it also attracts a wide range of insects that frogs love to eat. Swamp milkweed (*Asclepias incarnata*) attracts insects and provides habitat for frogs in moist areas.
- **Black-Eyed Susan** (*Rudbeckia spp.*): The bright yellow flowers of black-eyed susan attract insects, which are an essential food source for frogs.
- **Buttonbush** (*Cephalanthus occidentalis*): This native shrub produces spherical flowers that attract pollinators and provide cover for frogs near water bodies.
- **Wild Bergamot** (*Monarda fistulosa*): Wild bergamot is a nectar-rich plant that attracts pollinators, benefiting frogs indirectly by providing a steady supply of insect prey.

Perhaps you would like to build your own frog hotel. It is quite easy — all you need is PVC pipes, a container like a plastic tub or bowl, optional native water plants, pebbles, and safe, non-toxic paint for decoration. #### **CHORES AND PLANTING GUIDE FOR FEBRUARY - ZONE 10**

- Plant heat-tolerant annuals, such as crossandra, gazania, melampodium, and zinnia that will last into fall.
- Plant gladiola corms 6 inches apart and 4 inches deep; stake as they grow.
- Plant caladium for a showy tropical display all summer.
- Plant an array of culinary and medicinal herbs now. In addition to their culinary value, many herbs are ornamental and attract butterflies to the garden.
- This is the last month to plant arugula, beans, cantaloupe, carrots, celery sweet corn, endive, okra, radish, squashes, Swiss chard, and watermelon.
- Prune perennials and shrubs when new growth begins after the end of the dormant season. To guard next season's blooms, begin pruning after the last flowers fade but before the new buds set.
- · Add mulch to minimize weeds and conserve moisture during dry weather.
- Monitor landscape plants for insects, especially for the presence of aphids on tender new growth. Insects become more active during warm weather.
- Fertilize palms and ornamental shrubs if not done last month.
- Add variety and interest to the landscape and table for years by planting exotic fruits this month.
